Since 1985, Millspaugh has been Executive Vice-President, then President, and now Vice-Chairman of the Enterprise Development Company and Enterprise Real Estate Services, Inc. Both companies are for-profit consulting and development firms participating in mixed-use, leisure and entertainment-driven development projects in the US and overseas.

Alden Raine

Alden S. Raine is a consultant in urban development and transportation, whose current assignments include the \$400 million Providence Place Mall, station area development along San Juan's Tren Urbano corridor, and the redevelopment of Springfield's historic Union Station. From 1991–1993, Raine was Executive Director of the Massachusetts Port Authority; from 1983–1990 he was the state's Director of Economic Development and Chairman of the Governor's Development Cabinet. He has played a key role in the clean-up and redevelopment of Boston Harbor, in Boston's other "mega-projects" (Artery-Tunnel, North and South Stations, Southwest Corridor, Logan Airport modernization), and in city-building projects throughout Massachusetts. Raine graduated from Harvard College, received a Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Michigan, and taught at Rutgers and Clark Universities.

Barry Shaw

Barry Shaw is the Chief Executive of the North Architecture Centre and consultant on town planning, urban regeneration and conservation planning. He is currently expanding the role of the Kent Architecture Centre, its services and expertise, in view of the UK government's emphasis on urban renaissance.

He is a member of the English Heritage London Advisory Committee, and a member of the committee advising the Department of Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) on the remit for the Commission for Architecture and the Built Environment; is Visiting Critic at Harvard University Graduate School of Design, Unit for Housing and Urbanization; from 1993–1996 he was a Board Member of the Tower Hamlets Housing Action Trust; and formerly Head of Urban Design for London Docklands Development Corporation responsible for the design direction of Greenland Dock, Surrey Quays and Butlers Wharf – projects that have taken seventeen national and international awards. He was previously responsible for establishing the London Borough of Southwark Surrey Docks Team, following work as an architect planner with Milton Keynes Development Corporation.
