

## Spurred edges

'Spurred' refers to the topographic arrangement of an edge where higher ground projects in repeated fingered form (spurs) into a lower space. Spurs create niches at the lower level while the 'fingers' become vantage points and structures for play and sitting. Spurred edges can be naturalistic or geometric in form, or be combinations of both.

## Stacked edges

'Stacked' describes a topographic edge in which a change of level incorporates clusters of strongly vertical forms similar to (in form not scale) geological stacks. Stacks provide stepped forms which enable movement between levels and can be arranged in random or rhythmic groups suggesting 'naturalness'. They have the potential for incorporating plants and water. A stacked edge provides diverse forms for sitting, climbing and children's exploration.
