Robustness and inclusiveness

The very public nature of landscapes means that they are used by and must therefore be designed for a very wide range of people and activities. The quality that a landscape has when it provides simultaneously for diversity of use and experience can be defined as 'robustness' (Bentley

et al. 1984). Robust landscapes are accommodating, flexible and inclusive. They 'stand up to' and 'support' different interpretations and use. A frequent aim of design is to achieve robustness by creatively accommodating and reconciling different uses.
