aims at the creation of vibrant, desirable, and livable neighborhoods and town centers, integrated with their larger communities and preserving natural assets. In a world that too often seems enamored by the biggest or latest architectural trophy, this demands that urban designers focus on the well-being of inhabitants, on strengthening community, and on increasing civic engagement.

As I look out of my high window over the vast, variegated landscape of Shanghai, I look back with envy at the "frightful ills" of the city of 1956, and I wonder what future urban design can and will have as it engages with daunting new realities.
