- 4. Present the main findings.
- 5. Present the main conclusions

### **KFYWORDS**

Keywords are relevant and appropriate, consist of 5 keywords

### INTRODUCTION

The introduction section has a clear statement demonstrating that the focus of the study. The problem definition is stated clearly. There is a brief, well-articulated summary of research literature that substantiates the study.

### RESEARCH OBJECTIVE

The purposes, research question(s), and/or hypotheses appropriate to the topic and area of the study are related clearly

The paper introduction shows:

- 1. The importance of research
- 2. The benefit of research
- 3. People who will get the benefit of the research
- 4. Method/model need to be improved
- 5. The gap that will be filled by this research

### LITERATURE REVIEW

The paper mentions the literature review/related works.

- 1. Show appropriate preparation and knowledge through the background/review of literature in the related works.
- 2. The paper shows how it relates to the other work.

GAP

Comparison/contrast of different viewpoints/different research outcomes is made

### **DESIGN**

Clearly explain the research design, sampling procedure and instrument development

#### DATA COLLECTION

The data was collected helps the reader to evaluate the validity and reliability of the results, and the conclusions draw from them.

### DATA ANALYSIS

The paper has explanation of how data was collected/generated, explanation of how data was analyzed explanation of methodological problems and their solutions or effects

# **RESULTS/FINDINGS**

Results are presented clearly and analyzed appropriately. Results may cover:

- 1. Statement of results: the results are presented in a format that is accessible to the reader.
- 2. Tables and figures should be accompanied by text that guides the reader's attention to significant results.

### **DISCUSSION**

Discussion are presented clearly and analyzed appropriately. Discussion may cover:

- 1. Explanation of results
- 2. References to previous research
- 3. Deduction: a claim for how the results can be applied more generally
- 4. Hypothesis: a more general claim or possible conclusion arising from the results

The conclusions adequately give a summary of:

- 1. What was learned
- 2. What remains to be learned (directions for future research)
- 3. The shortcomings of what was done (evaluation)
- 4. The benefits, advantages, applications of the research (evaluation), and recommendations.
